

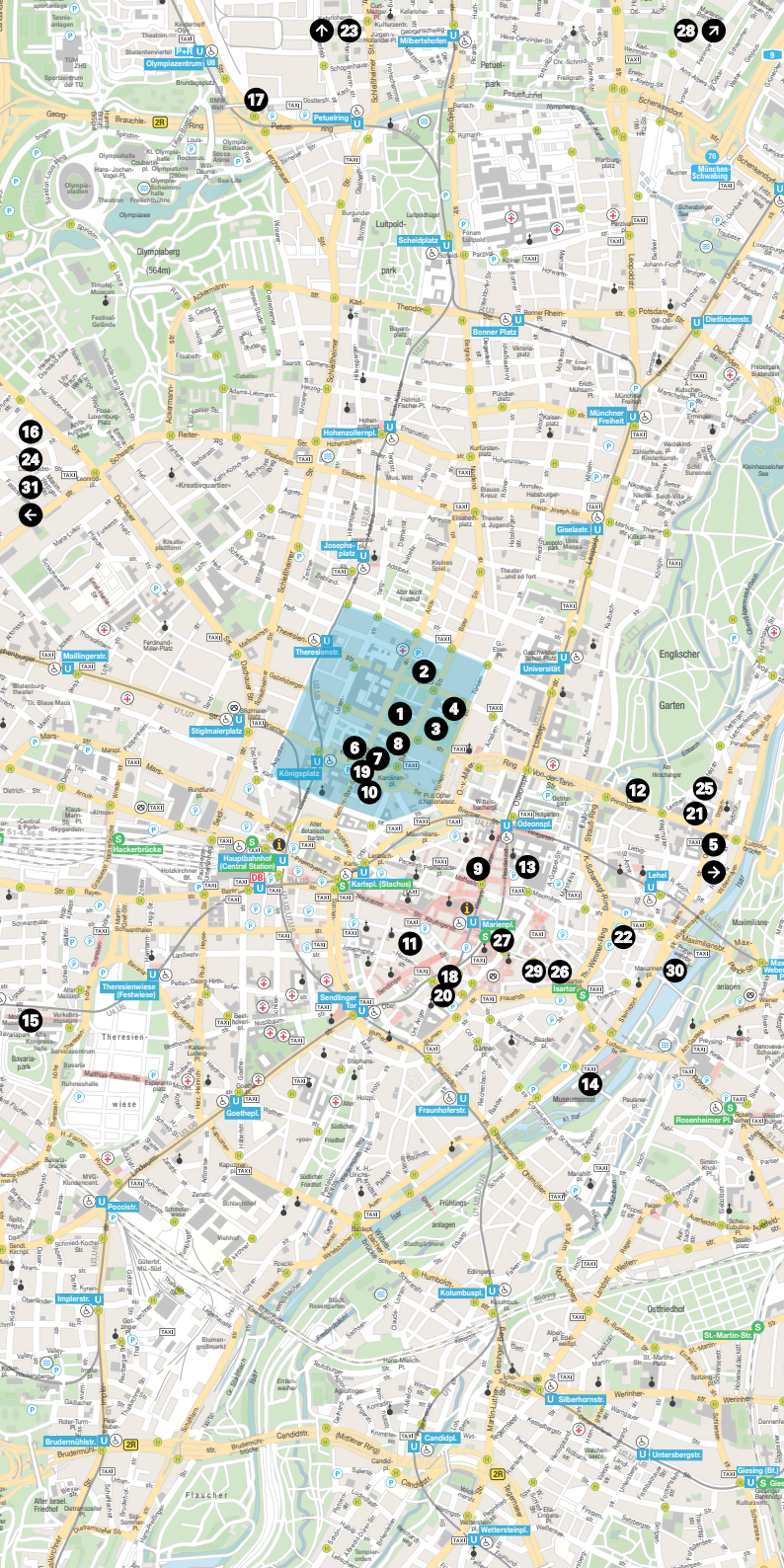

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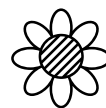

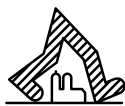

Munich's cultural heritage



Munich's museums have been increasing in number and variety for around two centuries. The number is so large and the variety so wide that they rank among the finest in the world. In addition to the uniquely compact Kunstareal, museums, exhibition spaces and memorials are dotted throughout the city.



Just imagine what the King of Bavaria Ludwig I (1786 to 1868), who reigned from 1825 to 1848, would think if he were to return to Munich for a day to inspect the state of the arts in his city. Few European monarchs were as avid an arts enthusiast as Ludwig I. He loved classical art and worked hard to make Munich one of the most important cultural metropolises in Europe, modeling it into his own "Athens on the Isar". He was the driving force behind the Glyptothek (opened in 1830), the Alte Pinakothek (opened in 1836), the Staatliche Antikensammlungen (opened in 1848) and the Neue Pinakothek (opened in 1853).

A journey through time with the monarch

What would he say if he were taken to the Lenbachhaus and shown Gabriele Münter's brightly colored landscapes, which create a blend of abstraction and reality with their two-dimensional compositions? Or Ernst Ludwig Kirchner's often grotesque expressionism in the Neue Pinakothek? Or Cy Twombly's large-format curly flowers at the Museum Brandhorst? And what would he think of the stunning transformations of space, which are charged with meaning, in the Haus der Kunst?



Art meets city

The Kunstareal in the heart of the Maxvorstadt district not only attracts visitors with its world-class museums but also with its large expanses of green, charming cafés and its proximity to universities, libraries and science hubs. So there is always something on offer here.

Genius or blasphemy?

Ludwig I should not be underestimated. His concept of art was surprisingly modern. He would therefore most likely quickly understand that this is art as he also once knew it: seeking to say something new in its time, challenging and often provocative. And if he were to be told that his vision of making Munich one of Europe's art capitals is now a reality, he would probably be extremely pleased. Munich is not only home to some of the most important museums and art institutions in the world, its wide variety of museums is also extremely visitor-friendly.

Culture cluster

If, for example, you are in a hurry and just want to take a "best-of" art tour, Munich's Kunstareal (art quarter) in the Maxvorstadt district is just the place for you. At the Alte Pinakothek, for example, you can discover classics from the 14th to the 18th century, at the Glyptothek, you can admire the Barberini Faun, the Lenbachhaus boasts the world's largest collection of works by the artists of The Blue Rider, and the Neue Pinakothek (expected to reopen in 2029) brings together some of the most important paintings of the 19th century with works by Caspar David Friedrich, Claude Monet and Vincent van Gogh. And you can see all this in just an hour. After all, one of the key qualities of the Kunstareal – also in comparison with other cities in Germany and the world – is the sheer number of outstanding museums in a

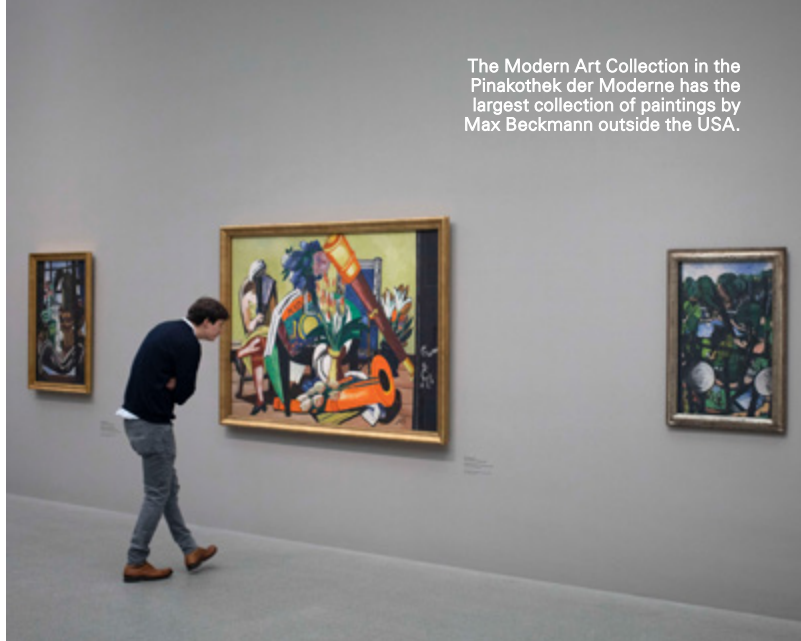
very small amount of space: no fewer than 18 major museums in a space measuring 500 x 500 meters. Munich is also just the place for those who are primarily interested in contemporary art. The Lenbachhaus Kunstbau, the Pinakothek der Moderne and first and foremost the Haus der Kunst present what the art world is currently talking about in major exhibitions. Those interested in art from the turn of the penultimate century will find what they are looking for at the Lenbachhaus and Villa Stuck. Anyone interested in Pop Art or the key trends of the 20th century can view some of the most impressive works at the Museum Brandhorst. In other words, King Ludwig I did a great job. Even today you would say, hats off to him!



Traveling through time

You can visit all the Pinakothek museums, the Museum Brandhorst and the Sammlung Schack with a single ticket. You can enjoy a journey through art history, starting with works from the 14th century all the way through to the present day.

The Modern Art Collection in the Pinakothek der Moderne has the largest collection of paintings by Max Beckmann outside the USA.

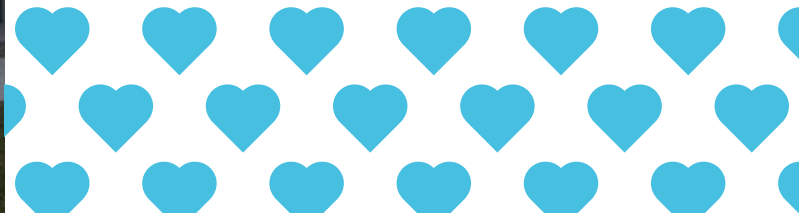


Historical witnesses in stone

Many museums are not only custodians of art and culture, but also witnesses to the city's history. They reflect Munich's eventful history – from the time of during which Bavaria was a kingdom to the World Wars through to post-war modernity.

The right museum for everyone

Munich's strength when it comes to museums is also evident in the fact that it is not just art lovers who will find what they're looking for. The NS-Dokumentationszentrum, also located in the Kunstareal, explores the history of National Socialism. The Deutsches Museum makes the hearts of technology fans beat faster, while the Bayerisches Nationalmuseum explains European cultural history in Bavaria in a unique way. At the Kindermuseum München, you are allowed to touch things, and the exhibitions at small specialized museums like the Deutsches Jagd- und Fischereimuseum, the Alpines Museum and the Bier- und Oktoberfestmuseum provide insights into worlds that the general public often know little about. To put it in a nutshell: There is a museum for everyone here, and since Munich doesn't experience many rainy days, you won't even come close to visiting them all.



1 Alte Pinakothek

Dürer, Raphael, Leonardo da Vinci, Titian, Rubens, Rembrandt: The Alte Pinakothek is dedicated to European painting from the 14th to the 18th century and houses some of the most important paintings from this period. With approximately 700 paintings, it is one of the leading art museums in Europe. It was built according to designs created by Leo von Klenze and opened in 1836. The ideal place to experience past eras through the eyes of their greatest artists.

2 Neue Pinakothek

The Neue Pinakothek is currently under renovation and will therefore be closed for several years. During this time, major works from the 19th century will be on display at the Alte Pinakothek and the Sammlung Schack. The exhibition "From Goya to Manet" at the Alte Pinakothek shows selected paintings and sculptures and offers a unique opportunity to experience the most famous paintings of these two museums under a single roof. At the Sammlung Schack, well-known works by Spitzweg, Schwind, Rottmann, Böcklin and Feuerbach from the Neue Pinakothek can be viewed in the exhibition entitled "Meeting of Minds". Information on the renovation and current exhibitions can be found on the website of the Staatliches Bauamt and in the online collection of the Pinakothek museums.

3 Pinakothek der Moderne

The Pinakothek der Moderne combines four museums – for art, graphic art, architecture and design – under one roof. It features extensive exhibitions of its permanent collection and regularly changing special exhibitions. The museum also sees itself as a meeting place. Discussions and exciting events are held here regularly. With one of the largest collections in Europe, the museum can draw on abundant resources when designing its program.

4 Museum Brandhorst

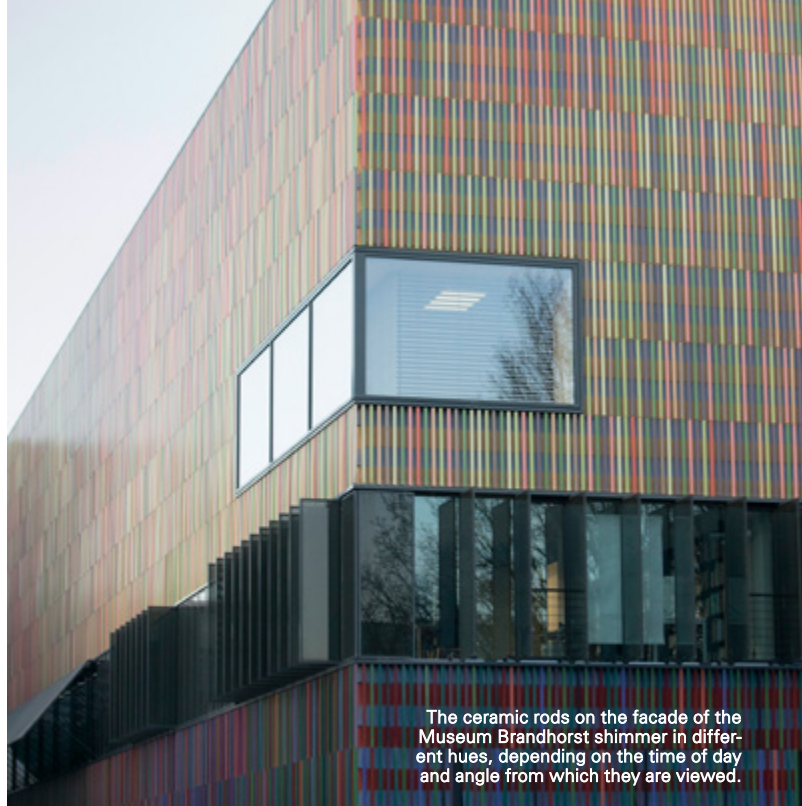
Behind the spectacular facade of 36,000 ceramic rods is one of Europe's most important collections of contemporary art – from the middle of the 20th century to the present day. The museum is based on the collection of Anette and Udo Brandhorst, which was made available to the public in 2009. With over 1,200 works by groundbreaking artists of the 20th and 21st centuries like Cy Twombly, Andy Warhol, Nicole Eisenman, Louise Lawler, Wolfgang Tillmans and Kerstin Brätsch, the Museum Brandhorst has a lot to offer. The exhibitions are dedicated to the major questions posed by art in recent decades.

5 Museum Villa Stuck

The building itself is a work of art: Franz von Stuck not only immortalized himself in paintings but also in his home not far from the Friedensengel (Angel of Peace monument). Many of the historic rooms are inspired by ancient times and decorated with precious ornaments. But the works of art are also exciting. In addition to major works by Stuck himself, the museum also hosts special exhibitions of contemporary art. After exploring the museum, we recommend a side tour to the artist's garden with its strictly laid out lawns and greened pergola.

6 Lenbachhaus / Kunstbau

At the end of the 19th century, the Munich painter Franz von Lenbach had a Tuscan-style villa built in the immediate vicinity of Königsplatz. The Lenbachhaus today is best known for its works by the Der Blaue Reiter (The Blue Rider) and has the world's largest collection of this art. It comprises works by Wassily Kandinsky, Gabriele Münter, Alexej von Jawlensky, Marianne von Werefkin and other artists from the group. In addition to 19th century paintings by artists associated with Munich, the Lenbachhaus also exhibits works by Joseph Beuys and Gerhard Richter. The adjoining Kunstbau, a large underground exhibition space above a subway station, is one of Munich's most exciting exhibition spaces for modern and contemporary art.

7 Glyptothek

The Glyptothek is Munich's oldest public museum and the only museum in the world dedicated solely to ancient sculpture. Built according to plans drawn up by architect to the court Leo von Klenze, it opened in 1830 and brings together Greek and Roman marble statues, including famous sculptures like the Barberini Faun and Medusa Rondanini. If you visit Munich in summer, you can attend one of the plays performed in the beautiful inner courtyard from July to September.

8 Staatliches Museum Ägyptischer Kunst

Merely entering the Staatliches Museum Ägyptischer Kunst sparks visions of temple rooms and royal tombs. It is housed in a subterranean building that you enter via a monumental portal. Once there, the museum invites you to immerse yourself in the world of ancient Egypt. The story of 5,000 years of art and culture are told through countless ancient Egyptian objects. Highlights of the exhibition include famous exhibits such as a fragment of Queen Sitdjehuti's golden coffin and the statue of a falcon-headed god.

9 Kunsthalle München

The Kunsthalle München in the heart of the city center is one of the most popular exhibition venues in Munich. It stages three large exhibitions a year, each of which focuses on a different topic. As a museum without a permanent collection, the possibilities are endless, with art ranging from antiquity to the present day. Be it decorative arts, design or fashion, photographs by Peter Lindbergh, or paintings by the Baroque portraitist Diego Velázquez: the wide range of art exhibited at the Kunsthalle is impressive.

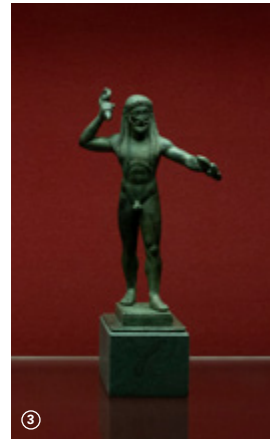
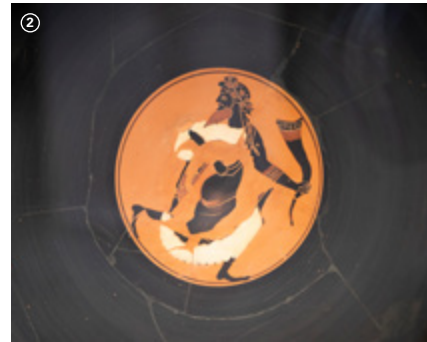

10 Staatliche Antikensammlungen

When it comes to art from ancient times, Munich has not only the Glyptothek but also another of the world's leading museums for antiquities: the Staatliche Antikensammlungen directly opposite on Königsplatz. Here you can see Greek, Roman and Etruscan works of art of outstanding quality. We owe our gratitude to Bavaria's King Ludwig I (1786 to 1868), who had a passion for antiquity and instructed his art agent in Rome to acquire only unique pieces. The collection of ancient Greek vases in particular ranks among the most important in the world.

11 Museum of Urban and Contemporary Art (MUCA)

Germany's first museum for urban art is located in a former substation. Works from nationally and internationally renowned artists from the urban and street art scene are exhibited here. The exhibitions in which works of urban art enter into dialog with other forms of contemporary art are also interesting. Even the facade is an eye-catcher: It was designed by the street artist Stohead and is intended to bring to mind calligraphy.

12 Haus der Kunst

The Haus der Kunst, located at the edge of the English Garden, is a global center for contemporary art with a transdisciplinary program. It hosts temporary exhibitions by both up-and-coming and established artists, as well as performances, installations, films and the once-a-month sound performance program "Tune". The building was first opened in 1937 as the Haus der Deutschen Kunst (House of German Art). The Archive Gallery is an exhibition space where this past is documented and the history of the museum is openly explored. The Haus der Kunst sees itself as a place to meet, with a participatory offer that invites the public to get involved.

13 Residenzmuseum

The Residenz is one of the largest palace complexes in Germany and was the main residence and seat of government of the Wittelsbach dynasty until 1918. This makes it one of those exhibition venues that is worth visiting for the building alone. Historic state rooms, the treasury and the art collections offer impressive insights into the life led by the House of Wittelsbach. Most of the furniture and paintings, tapestries, sculptures and art treasures can still be found in the same places for which they were once created.

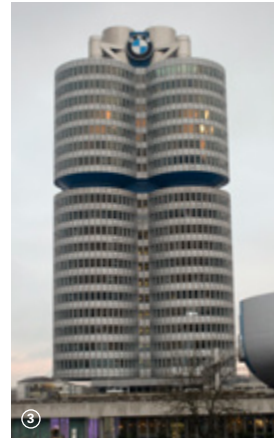

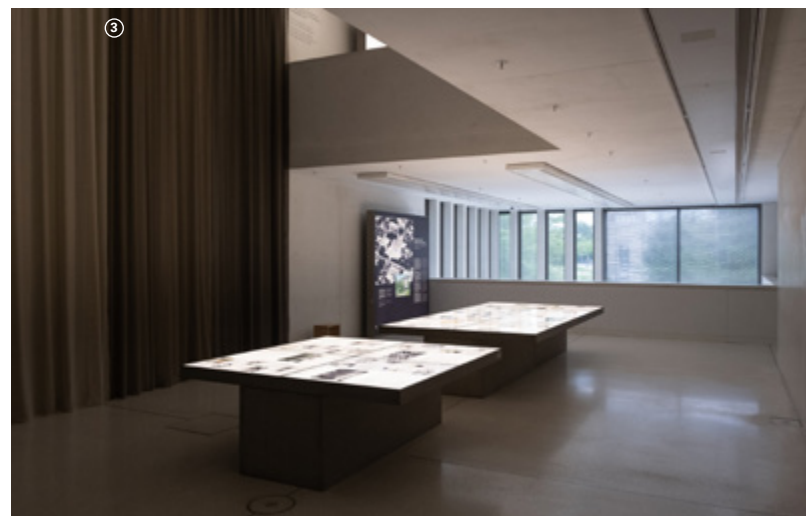

The collection spans regional and European art from the early Middle Ages through to Art Nouveau, including sculptures, paintings and decorative arts. A particular highlight is the renowned collection of nativity scenes with figures from Naples, Sicily and the Alpine region.

23 Schlossanlage Schleissheim

What is now considered one of the most beautiful and largest Baroque complexes in Germany had humble beginnings as a simple manor house built by Duke Wilhelm V in 1598. His son Elector Maximilian I expanded it into a palace. It was expanded further under Elector Max Emanuel (1679 to 1726), who at the time had ambitious plans to become emperor and wanted a fitting residence. The main features of the extensive castle complex have remained almost unchanged to this day. A trip here can be combined wonderfully with a visit to Flugwerft Schleisseim, which is part of the Deutsches Museum and documents the history of aviation.

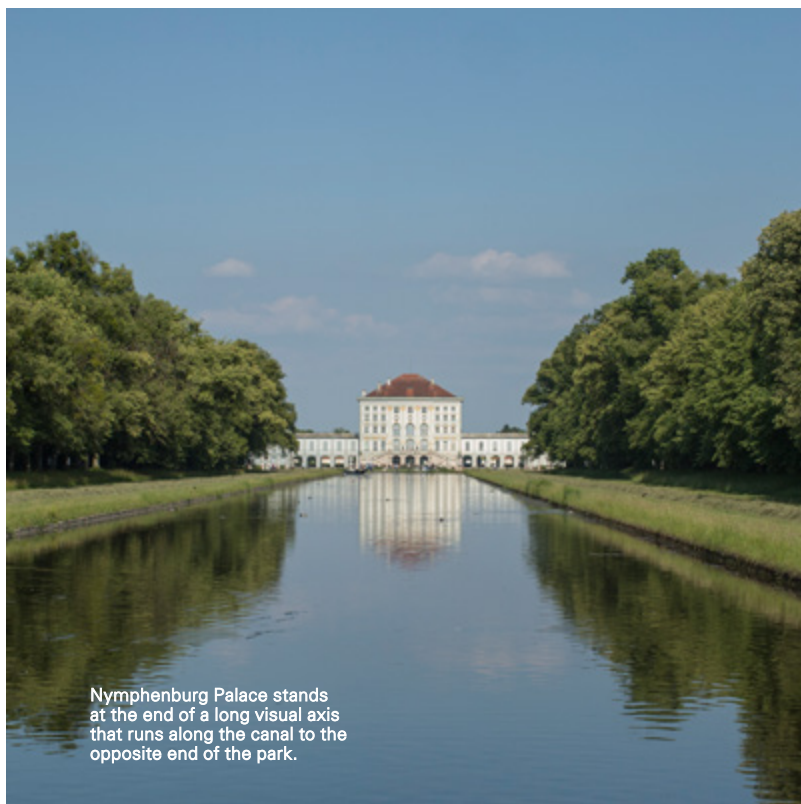

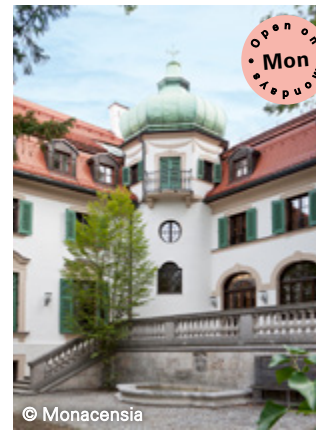

26 Valentin-Karlstadt-Musäum

A somewhat “different” museum: Instead of old masters, the Valentin Karlstadt Museum offers a cabinet of curiosities. The museum is dedicated to the life and work of the Munich comedian and folk singer Karl Valentin (1882 to 1948) and his congenial partner, Liesl Karlstadt, as well as the history of Munich folk singers. Valentin is still well-known and well-loved far beyond the borders of Bavaria – first and foremost for his bizarre sense of humor. The exhibits include a brick weighing four kilos that had to be presented as an “admission ticket” when the museum opened, and the nail upon which Valentin “hung up” his job as a carpenter when he decided to become a comedian.

31 Museum Nymphenburger Porzellan

The Museum Nymphenburger Porzellan presents a unique collection of porcelain from the 18th to the 20th century in one of the southern cavalier houses at Nymphenburg Palace. Elector Max III Joseph founded the porcelain factory in the 18th century; it still produces porcelain today and is synonymous worldwide with the highest quality. At the time, the factory produced not only tableware but also elaborate figurines as table decorations. The museum is located on the upper floor of the Marstall Museum. The ground floor is also not to be missed. This is where the Wittelsbach's magnificent carriages and sleighs are displayed.

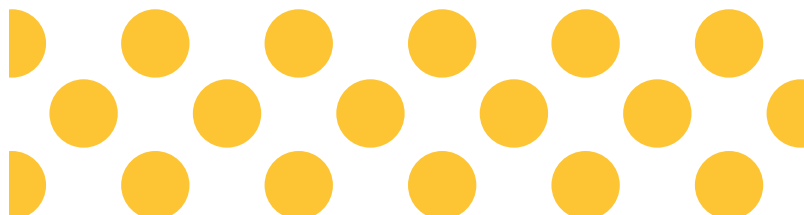

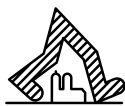

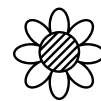
